



Term 1

Kaupapa Matua 2023

Since we have only had a year to explore and comprehend the workings of the Maramataka, this is still at the centre of our teaching and learning this year. Understanding how our tupuna lived their lives with the knowledge of the taiao as an essential component has been an exceptional learning experience.

We'll keep growing our knowledge this year. The five major moon phases, which also indicate the kinds of activities and/or tasks that are completed throughout each week, will serve as a guide for our learning programmes.

Whiro and Tamatea phases, students will remain in their home room classes. Whiro moons will include journaling, whakatauki, karakia, ōku whakawhētai, ōku whainga, ngā akoranga, ngā wero etc. Tamatea moons will include a study specific to maramataka, raukawatanga, whānau etc.		Rākaunui moons will consist of physical activities – Fitness, Māori performing arts, Sports. Key Features

The colour coding on the calendar displays which learning programme are taught on which days and how lessons will be conducted, with an awareness of energy levels and common behaviours likely to be displayed. The lower energy moons will be less interactive more quiet type activities however, the higher energy moons will consist of more physical movement, focussed study and collaboration.

Term 1

Kaupapa O Te Wā

The lessons gave the students enough to think about and provided them with lots of informative information.

Hōtaka Pūoro - Music Classes

For those who chose to study puoro as an extra-curricular, formal classes will start next term. This is in addition to their normal rotation classes. Once or twice per week, tamariki will have time scheduled off from their classes to work with Matua Maui. Bass guitar, piano, percussion/drums, guitar, and vocal groups will all be covered in these lessons.





Hōtaka Āta Tautoko -Acceleration Program

The following term will see the launch of an accelerated programme with a particular emphasis on literacy and numeracy. The goal of the programme is to support students who need one-on-one help to accelerate their learning. Whaea Samantha will oversee the programme, and students' families will be informed early on in the following term. The course outline will be fully described on the pānui.

Whakatau Wairua

Whakatau wairua is an important part of our day where we give our tamariki the opportunity to reset and find inner calm. During this time, our children sit still and quietly while focusing on gentle music to bring their minds and bodies to a peaceful state. Following the maramataka has taught us to be more aware of how to manage our energies and achieve things at the right time. This practice helps our children to make the most of good days and cope with not-so-good ones.

To diversify our activities, we have introduced 'Tuhi Mauri Tau,' which involves quiet and sustained writing. This change was prompted by our concern for the students who have difficulty forming letters and writing at a reasonable speed, which often leads to frustration due to the amount of time it takes them to complete a task.

To further support your child's writing development at home, you may consider providing them with writing tasks to complete.










Hōtaka Āta Tautoko – Acceleration Program

The 'Hotaka Ata Tautoko' is an acceleration program designed to support the progress and achievement of our tamariki who require an extra boost. This program will commence this term, and ākonga who will participate in it will receive notification. The primary focus will be on strengthening their literacy and numeracy skills. These classes will be taught by Whaea Samantha and will be in addition to their regular classes. The program will also include building vocabulary, particularly for students who have joined our "Ohu" with little or no knowledge of the reo. This will support their transition into the Ohu and help them to learn comfortably in a non-threatening environment.

Term 1


















Chess

Sevens is a sport we will be focusing on in the future and look forward to returning Tūiranuku again.


















Waikato Swimming Sports

Overnight Camping – Jim Barnett Reserve

Our group had an opportunity to explore our very own backyard at Jim Barnett Reserve. This reserve area has been placed under a QEII Covenant, meaning it is a protected reserve and it has two allocated camping areas with a supply of water, making it an ideal site for our introductory camping/tramping experience.

The focus for our students was to learn fundamental skills for self-management and self-sustained camping. Monday was spent packing our bags with everything we required, from sleeping bags and mats, tents, pots and cookers, right down to each person's kai. Everything each person needed for the 24 hours to follow was inside their pack.

We started our walk on Tui Track at the northern end of the reserve and made our way to the bush campsite. To ensure our students got the most out of this experience we decided to continue walking down Totara Track to the main campsite with better facilities for teaching our students all the skills they required. We arrived at camp at 3.15pm and got straight into setting up our camp. Quickly the tents went up, beds were made and on to the next task it was. Some students went off to gather firewood while others began cooking dinner before we lost the sunlight.

After eating a delicious Spaghetti Bolognaise, we cleaned up our pots and cooking space before settling down around the campfire, roasting marshmallows, eating s'mores, singing, laughing and spending time together.

It was a chilly night, and the frost settled on each tent as dawn broke. Te Aorangi was up bright and early stoking up the fire again. He quickly got it to flame up which was a welcomed warmth by everyone as they all emerged from



their tents. Students began to cook their groups breakfasts and pack down their campsites.

Our fire was buried, and all evidence removed to teach our students about 'leave no trace' camping. We put on our packs and headed back through the bush. A lot of valuable learning took place throughout this journey. This was a new experience for most of our students. It allowed for students to shine in areas that they normally wouldn't within a classroom setting. More opportunities and experiences such as this will be coming for more of our year levels in Wharekura.

Our students had been part of our Hiringa programme throughout Term 2 which required a high level of commitment from each student. This programme provided our students with learning, understanding, and experiences to improve their hauora through physical and mental training. This programme set us students up with the skills and abilities to perform at a high level for the NAS tournament.

The tournament is a four-day tournament, and it started early Monday morning with a pōwhiri, hosted by the Top of the South region. Days 1-3 where round robin games were regions faced off against another region in all sports. On day one the CNIAS teams played

South of the South and each of the sports our kura represented in won. Day two games were played against the Top of the South and both Ki-o-Rahi and Basketball won, however the Top of the South took the win in Rugby. On the final day of the round robin, CNIAS played against Northland. This is the day that students were selected to represent them Island, either the North Island or the South Island. CNIAS won in Rugby, Ki-o-rahi and Basketball against Northland, which resulted in most of these teams selected to represent the North Island were from central schools.

Term 4 Hawaii Exchange

Mahalo e na keiki, e na makua, e na ohana o Te Wharekura o Te Kaokaoroa o Pātetere

As you will all know by now, at the end of last term, we were fortunate to take a contingent of 53 ākonga and kaiako to Hawaii on a ten-day cultural exchange.

Our time in Hawaii was jam-packed with visits to local Hawaiian schools where our students participated in the exchange of cultural performances, ideas and gifts. The first of these schools that we visited was Waipahu High School which is located on the northern side of Pearl Harbour.

With a current school roll of 2,000 students, our group was overwhelmed with the hospitality received from this school. We received a traditional Hawaiian welcome and were entertained by the various cultural groups of the school. Followed this, our students performed for the entire school before being hosted for lunch by the Hawaiian group and the Samoan Polynesian group. We were then invited back a week later for the homecoming American Football game which involved some of our students escorting their Football Team (Waipahu High School Marauders) onto the field.

For some of our students, this was a highlight of the trip. During our time in Hawaii, we also visited culturally significant places such as the Kūkaniloko Birthing stones and the Maunawila Heiau. These wāhi tapu were traditionally known as Heiau and served different purposes for the Hawaiian people.

Our ropu were privileged to visit and experience these places first-hand and listen to the korero tuku iho, history and significance of these places. Our students were also able to work alongside some students from the bi-lingual unit of Kahuku High School in the building of a traditional hale (whare).

Our students were also fortunate enough to interact with a Tahitian hula group (Mana Tahiti) during our stay in Hawaii. Whilst this was an impromptu get together, our students were able to learn a bit of the Tahitian culture and their cultural hula dance as well as teaching some basic aspects of te ao Māori. We look forward in engaging with this cultural group as they are working towards a trip to Aotearoa next year.

Another highlight of our trip was our visit to the Polynesian Cultural Center (PCC) in Lā'ie on the North shore of Oahu. This tourist attraction attracts thousands of tourists every year to experience the various cultures of the Pacific.

Our students were fortunate enough to be invited to perform at the Aotearoa exhibition which drew in a large crowd. Following this, our students were free to go and experience the other cultural exhibitions around the Polynesian Cultural Center.

They were then treated to a luau before going to watch the night show which was spectacular. Again, for many of our students, this was a highlight of the trip.

Other places our students visited during our stay was Pearl Harbour, the University of Hawaii (Ka Waiwai Moili'ili) the Bernice Bishop Museum, the Dole Pineapple Plantation, Turtle Bay, the Alamoana Shopping Center, the Hilton Lagoon, the Waikele Outlet Shopping Center and the Waikiki strip.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone that supported this kaupapa, Te Kaokaoroa ki Hawaii 2023. To everyone that supported with our fundraising ventures and efforts, sponsorships, grants and the various kaupapa we held over the year to successfully get our ropū over to Hawaii, please accept this as a token of our gratitude.



Kura Waitī

Throughout this year, a selected number of Year 9 and 10 students took part in the Kura Waitii Programme organised and ran by Te Toki Voyaging alongside the Waikato Regional Council. Each term students learnt about different aspects of voyaging on the river and elements of the river that are essential to its survival.

This day our students learnt how to set a hīnaki and the importance of tuna in our awa. The day was filled with interactive learning and practical experiences. In addition to the setting and collecting of the hīnaki, our students were out on the river practicing their waka ama skills.

We are thankful to all those who made it possible for our students to be part of this programme. We look forward to continuing and building on the knowledge and learnings from this year as we progress into Taumata rua, Kura Waitī in the coming year.
